In October 2003, ten professionals from the United Kingdom spent two weeks touring East Africa, providing our community youth there a chance to get first-hand information about career and university choices, gaining work experience, and life in the West.

Under the auspices of the Careers, Education and Training Advisory Board (CETAB) of the World Federation and Africa Federation, the professionals visited four cities running workshops, giving lectures and dispensing advice about career selection and progression. The group consisted of Shabbar Dhalla (Law); Murtaza Kanani (Dentistry); Gulamabbas Mohamed (Computer Science), Sameer Harji (Computer Science with Business & Management); Nadir Rajpal



(Computing & Operational Research); Fatema Datoo (Podiatry); Sidika Hudda (Human Psychology); Sukaina Jaffer (Podiatry); Sukaina Manekia (Radiography) and Fatim Kurii (Law).

The trip also benefited the professionals who were able to gain an insight into life and work in East Africa.

Two surveys were conducted to gauge the public's reaction to the sessions that had been organised. In Nairobi, the majority of 14-17 year olds gave the maximum rating for the session, while in Mombasa, respondents absorbed all the information given to them and then requested more! The sessions were thought to be extremely useful. More professionals were encouraged to visit: "We missed this opportunity in our time," said one 'over-35' participant.

A concise summary was provided by one of the participants; "An opportunity to help others and give something back to the community. An experience to visit Africa and a chance to see our community at large. Also I had the opportunity to re-establish links with my extended family and meet relations that I did not know about. I would definitely recommend that this continue in the future with different groups."



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Four years on, one can not help but remember Mulla Asghar's timeless words on the timely need to understand the need of the times to recognize the goals of this community: "Time has come" he said, "that we recognize our goal. What do we need? We need a society where every act of good-will is propelled and driven by the sincere intention to please Allah and none else."



At the same time, demonstrating a commitment to excellence in the Community, he stated that ".....we rise above the mean and the mediocre to that which is high and sublime."

In order to achieve this he boldly opined as early as 1975 that "Unless the youth of this community are prepared and have girdled their loins to serve the community to the best of their abilities, this community left in the hands of the hardcore traditionalists will not be able to take any strides ahead."

Mulla always held tenaciously to his principles, which, on occasion, led to decisions which seemed out of step with prevailing trends. That meant he pleased many and displeased some, or sometimes pleased a few and displeased many. But then who said Mulla was a fair-weather leader who backed down because of public opinion. Though he was always for the unity of the community, he maintained that could not be done at expense of "Compromising on the basic fundamentals....," He said "Weak partners will never make a strong team."

In 1987, he penned a tribute to Mulla Thawara, which rings so true about himself:

-AME SHU" NE AMARI VAAT SHU'. TYAREJ SAMJASHE.

-UTHI CHALYA JAASHU' TAMARI ANJUMAN MA' THI.

What we were and what we said will then be understood

When no longer, we will grace your sittings and assemblies.

Countless minds were set thinking, many lives changed by him. His impact on our society remains nothing short of phenomenal and understood correctly his words continue to shift paradigms.

Azadari in Bam and Baravat, Muharram 1425

The people of Bam and Baravat have been able to undertake Azadari of Imam Hussain (AS) in the semi permanent structures that have been built with the support of the World Federation. WF President Ahmed Hassam presided over the opening ceremony of the Jaffery Kindergarten in Nairobi. Chairman of Africa Federation, Zulfikar Khimji, and Chairman of Nairobi Jamaat, Akber Karawalli, were present with other community leaders and members of Nairobi Jamaat. The WF

President complimented the Nairobi Jaffery Education Board and the Nairobi Jamaat for the design of both the Nursery and the larger complex.



The World Federation donated £20,000 to meet the shortfall on this project. Dr. Hassam acknowledged that the community worldwide puts an emphasis on education and it is important to ensure that we provide both religious and secular guidance to our children. He also highlighted the importance of providing for the professional development of our teachers as well, be they teaching at our madaris or schools.

WF PRESIDENT VISITS:

THAILAND

Dr Ahmed Hassam, visited various organisations in Bangkok, Thailand on 2nd and 3rd February 2004. He held several fruitful meetings with the Office Bearers and Trustees of these organisations, amongst which were:

Masjid Al Huda - This mosque, with heavy debts and under order to be demolished by a court order, was rescued by The World Federation following an appeal on its website and mumineen donated generously to save this beautiful mosque. The loans and legal matters having been resolved now have enabled Tableegh work to commence in earnest. Sheikh Gulam Ali Abazar, the resident aalim, welcomed the President and gave him a tour of the mosque.

Imam Bargha, Charoenpass, over a century old is perhaps the oldest timber structured Imambargah in the centre of Bangkok which was in dire need of reconstruction. It has now been rebuilt with modern materials and the World Federation contributed Baht 700,000 towards its cost. Dr. Hassam met the Trustees and several students of the Al Khoe Madressah, which is attached to the Imambargah. A number of students from the Madressah having proceeded to Qum have now returned to propagate the tableegh throughout Thailand.



AUSTRALIA

The President of The World Federation attended the groundbreaking ceremony of The Imam Hasan (A.S) Islamic Centre in Annangrove, Sydney, Australia on the day of Eid e Gadeer 1424 (10 February 2004). The project, initiated in June 2002 by the family of Abdulhusayn (Meghji) Aly and Hamida Aly, had to surpass a number of obstacles to build this Islamic Centre for the propagation of the teachings of Ahlulbayt (A.S). Amongst the obstacles they had to surmount was stiff opposition from the local residents, which was widely covered not only within the mainstream Australian media and television, but also in the broadsheets of the UK press. However, with the strength derived from the nobility of the whole project, Al Haj Abbas Aly persisted and finally was granted permission by the local courts to build the Centre.







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IEB signs agreement with Madrasah in Qum

On Saturday 17th January 2004/24th Dhu al Qadah 1424AH, the Chairman of the WF-Islamic Education Board (IEB), Shaikh Safder Jaffer and the Principal of Madrassah Imam Ali (AS), Syed Salman Naqvi, signed a memorandum on educational and cultural co-operation between their respective institutions.

This project aims to establish contacts between Madrassah Imam Ali (AS) and members of the World Federation, and in doing so promote the madrassah amongst community members mainly in India and Pakistan.

The project will provide resident Aalims and Dhakireen who are graduating, and also those who are affiliated to the Madrassah Imam Ali (AS), to serve in various World Federation member communities, ensuring that the community has access to the wealth of knowledge and understanding that they possess.

IEB will also help the madrassah with systems development, management skills and strategic planning. Shaikh Safder Jaffer said "This is a unique



step taken by The World Federation that will help deliver the strategic plan and meet the needs of the community. We are now investing resources and time to develop new mediums and resources that the Ulama & Dhakireen can access to enhance their Islamic education efforts and communication with all parts of the community."

The Madrassah Imam Ali (AS) will help organise and co-ordinate summer short-term courses for youths of World Federation member communities, in addition to medium term courses for the youth. Furthermore, it will strengthen relationship between IEB and other organisations such as the

International Centre of Islamic Studies (ICIS), Qum and others, widening the pool of resources available to all. It will also undertake the groundwork for establishing a state-of-the-art resource centre owned by IEB, which would consolidate resources from all English speaking scholars in Qum.

Spread the Warmth Campaign

This campaign was launched on the occasion of Eid e Mubahila in the name of the Ahlul Bayt who have spread their warmth to the Muslim Ummah through the historic event of Hadith e Kisa, the narration of the blanket.

The Seniors Advisory Board will be holding a number of blanket drives that are region specific.

The purpose of the "Spread the Warmth" Campaign is to raise awareness of the struggles some of our seniors are facing around the world today. There are seniors in our communities who don't even have the basics to survive. For many people buying a coat or warm clothing is a common activity, but in some communities, such as in India, seniors are dying of hypothermia only because they cannot afford to buy warm blankets. Small individual contributions to this Campaign will save the lives of our underprivileged Muslim Shia Ithna-asheri seniors.

The benefits of donating to this campaign go far beyond this world. The Holy Prophet (SAW) said: "He who decreases a grief out of the grieves of this world for his Muslim brother, Allah will decrease for him a grief out of the grieves of the Hereafter."

Region by region, city by city, the SAB will endeavour to "Spread the Warmth" to all of our Muslim Shia Ithna-asheri seniors who are suffering from the cold winter nights. The Campaign will end when blankets have been provided to as many seniors as possible around the world who fall victim to the freezing temperatures typical in their homeland.

Thanks to the generous contribution of a single donor, SAB will be providing Muslim Shia seniors of Bihar, India with warm blankets for the winter. About 90% of these seniors are Sadat. SAB is indeed grateful to the donor. May Allah (SWT) accept this generous deed of the donor. Amen.

Report on Online matchmaking sites

Research was carried out by the Women's Desk in preparation for the launch of a matchmaking site for our community is revealing more than a few surprises!

- 1. Ahmad, a 45 year old religious leader at a mosque in Sacramento, California, admits to having initial concerns about whether online matchmaking was sanctioned under the tenets of Islamic law, which prohibits dating. Considering t9he matter further he found a burgeoning community of Muslims seeking other Muslims online, with the sole intention of arranging a traditional marriage. He found the Internet being used effectively as matchmaker; testament to this was the fact that he found himself, 15 months later, married to a woman he met on the site!
- 2. Traditionally, observant Muslims have marriages arranged through relatives or a matchmaker who scours the local community, friends, and neighbours for a suitable and compatible spouse. But in a global age when Muslim families, like so many others, are increasingly dispersed, the nexus of some Islamic communities has dissolved, making it difficult for individuals to find people they know and trust. Especially for second-generation Muslims living in Europe or North America, the local field of prospective spouses is limited. As families begin to extend their search, the Internet has been embraced as the newest tool in the oldest practice of an ancient faith.
- 3. Ali Rizvi, whose Texas-based ShiaMatch.com caters specifically to Islam's minority group, points out that he launched his site in 1999 with five or six users and has since seen the active membership logs surpass 9,000.

Inshallah, the Women Desk will soon finalise their research and present their findings and plans.

Nisar Sheraly appointed to assess our Educational Institutions

The IEB of The World Federation has appointed Nisar Sheraly to assess the needs of our Madaris and Schools. He shall visit institutions in each region and carry out an independent assessment of the current academic standards and administrative systems.

He will also be involved in collecting data from each of our educational institutions and analysing the needs specific to each region. This includes developing and updating a directory and network of all our educational institutions, muallims (teachers) and professional religious and secular educators both within and outside the community. Syllabi and other administrative efforts by Madaris will also be collated and audited along with a list of supplementary notes and books.

The following Madaris will be involved in the initial program: Shia Ithna Asheri Madressa - Stanmore, Hujjat Saturday Workshop - Stanmore, Hussaini Madressa in Mombasa, Nairobi, Dar-es-Salaam, HUSAYNI MADRASSAH - Toronto, Dar es Salaam Girls, Az-Zahra Madressah -Minnesotta, Islamic Education Center of Orlando and Dubai.



Aeinullah Eye Clinic & Zainabiya Health Centre in Lucknow

The Medical Advisory Board of The World Federation has extended its work in curing eye diseases by opening a new eye clinic in Lucknow, capital of Uttar Pradesh, a northern state of India. Following on from its success with clinics built in Patna and Bangalore in India last year, the Aeinullah Eye Clinic in Lucknow aims to continue the work to restore sight to those who cannot see.

It is possible for about 70% of the world's blind population to regain their eyesight, but in India there is a backlog stretching to over three years before simple cataract procedures can be performed.

The World Federation embarked on the Zainabiya medical project in Lucknow to alleviate the suffering of its poor and needy by providing primary health care, medical aid and treatment for eye diseases.

Lucknow has a strong presence of sadaats (direct descendents of the Holy Prophet). It has many hawza-e-ilmiya (universities of Islamic studies) and many of our respected Islamic scholars have graduated from Lucknow.

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Zainabiya Child Sponsorship Scheme

The ZCSS of the World Federation was established in 1981 to combat illiteracy from among the shia's of the world.

Currently 400 new students have applied for the sponsorship. Nearly 3000 students are on files who do not have the certainty of a one to one sponsorship, but rely on excess or sporadic funds, through generous donations. There are also 25 new Higher Education applicants.


The Zainabiya Child Sponsorship (ZCSS) has an undulating cycle. ZCSS receives applications for Sponsorships in Stanmore, the members of our community make a contribution, a child receives an education and somewhere along the line everybody is uplifted.

The Zainabiya Child Sponsorship Scheme works. In the 22 years since it was established, ZCSS has witnessed students who have taken this once in a life time opportunity and succeeded to become doctors, engineers, computer programmers and lecturers; others have ventured into trade and business. Some of them have reciprocated by sponsoring other students. At the very least this educational opportunity makes these children literate and better placed someday to catapult their own children to higher education.

Students are being sponsored for a period of 1 to 14 years study - from Kindergarten to Post Graduate studies. You may sponsor for any period of 1 year or more, but preferably for a minimum period of 3 years to allow the student to gain maximum advantage.

The monthly donation GB120 or USD180 or Can. D240 per child per year is more than what will be sent to the sponsored child initially. The rest will be accumulated in the Zainabiya Child Sponsorship Scheme Fund. This fund will cater for administration and emergencies that may arise in the Scheme - like supporting a child when a sponsor parent cannot support any more and before finding a new sponsor parent or when a child suddenly needs major medical care or when the child's parent or bread winner falls ill or dies. It also enables us to increase contributions to the child to meet increases in expenses without having to come to you each time.
