We are trying to look for a donor who will sponsor the project for at least the next 3 years.</li> <li>Temeke, Dar es salam -Tanzania: Land has been bought in Temeke, Tanzania for Aeinullah Eye Clinic and the Title Deeds have been transferred to Dar es Salaam Jamaat.</li> <li>Mianwali, Pakistan: The clinic is self funding and we do not contribute anything towards it save for equipment that needs to be purchased on occasional basis.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Dr Rahil Kassamali has volunteered to help develop the centre so that it can provide better services. He has been in contact with Prof Sami and will be working on strategic achievable goals</li> <li>Lucknow Aeinullah Eye clinic is looking into increasing the income of the eye clinic by trying to hire the theatre facilities to private eye specialists.</li> <li>Building Plans are to be drawn by an architect according to requirements.</li> <li>Iraq: Dr Munir is in correspondence with Al Hakim Foundation to weigh the possibilities of opening an Aeinullah Eye Clinic in Iraq in partnership with</li> </ul>





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2	Zainabiya Health Centre	<ul> <li>Bangalore: ZHC in Bangalore is self funding.</li> <li>Pottenahali: ZHC in Pottenahali opened successfully in May 2009. Regular reports are being sent by Meer Murtaza Hussain. We are hopeful that this clinic will become self funding in 3 years time.</li> <li>Lucknow: Patients come to this centre on referral basis from all over U.P area. Patients are first assessed and a thorough investigation is carried on the patients' financial needs before sending them to the ZHC in Lucknow. Accommodation, transport, meals and medication is provided during their stay. We have committed to £6,000 per annum although the need is much greater then that. WF pays only for Non- Sadaat patients. Tanzeemul Makatib pays for all Sadaat patients and this amount comes to more then 6000 Pounds.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>As the centre is only 100 meters away from a school funded by ZCSS, the school would benefit from the centre by getting health screening for the children and basic health education.</li> <li>We are trying to look for a donor who will sponsor the project for at least the next 3 years. The annual budget that we have allocated in £6000</li> </ul>
		• <b>Patna:</b> The health centre is providing primary health care facilities for the poor and need of the surrounding are. There is a great need to increase the capacity of this health centre. Dr Rahil Kassamali has come on board and is at the moment communicating with Prof Sami Askari and looking at strategies to improve the services of ZHC in. Annual cost for running the clinic is £4,500. We are trying to look for a donor who will sponsor the project for at least the next 3 years.	There is a great need for the community in the villages of Bihar to be made aware and educated from health perspective. A lady from Gopalpur has been trained by Unicef, who will in turn train other ladies as health visitors and go into the community and impart not only health information but also let the community know about local resources that may be available.





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3	Zainabiya Polyclinic	• Lucknow: The Zainabiya Polyclinic opened in June 2009. It was agreed when this project took off that it will be self funding within a year's time. However the clinic did not get a very good response from the people as they were getting cheaper healthcare together with medication (bogus powders) elsewhere. It was decided that to prevent people to receive these bogus medications, the clinic would charge the same price (INR 5.00 per patient) as the other bogus centres but provide with good service and medication.	<ul> <li>We have estimated INR 25,000.00 per month as the cost of running the clinic including medications</li> <li>A review is scheduled to take place in July 2010 to ascertain the exact costs of running the clinic together with medications at the cost of INR 5.00 per patient. And also to review the income being generated.</li> </ul>
4	Hajj Medical Mission	The IMI Hajj Medical Mission provided very good services to the Hujjaj. In Makkah, All doctors got together to discuss ways on how to better services to the Hujjaj. This year WF was able to provide contact details of IMI HMM doctors to all groups from our community. IMI HMM were available 24 hours a day at the end of telephone and also facilities were available for the doctors to visit the hotel where our community members were staying. This service though was not well utilised by our community members	Planning for next year has started. We are hoping to provide services for Niyabat, Umra Mufridda and sunnat tawaf to raise funds which would then go towards sponsoring doctors and buying medications





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5	Autistic Day Care Centre	<ul> <li>The Autistic Centre is running well and provides very good service to the autistic children of Dar es Salaam. It is earning a lot of esteem for the World Federation and has a more potential.</li> <li>It is being managed by Dr Zulfikar Abbas</li> <li>A state of the art Minibus was donated in January of 2010. This will ease the transport problems of children coming to the WFADCC</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>The Autistic Centre needs to be relocated as the landlord wants to increase the rent every so often. The current rent is 30,000 US Dollars per year. The project has been entered into in partnership with the KSI Jamaat of Dar es Salaam, the Africa Federation and The World Federation.</li> <li>Arusha, Tanzania: As per the economic up-liftment resolution passed at the Dubai Conference in 2003, the World Federation is financing the entire project of 12 flats for the needy in Arusha, Tanzania at a cost of USD \$260,000. The housing is for the needy only, and no rent shall be charged over and above that required for the maintenance of the property.</li> <li>District of Hangu, Pakistan: The World Federation partnered with a local NGO, the Hussaini Foundation of Pakistan, to rebuild homes in the fragile district of Hangu, Pakistan. In early 2009, over 27 houses were destroyed and 74 homes damages in Hangu by the groups affiliated to the Al Qaeda. Efforts are underway to determine how best to help the people of Haiti in their time of need. To this end, The World Federation is working with:  • Dr. Mohsin Jaffer, Executive Councillor of The World Federation and NASIMCO who has been involved in coordinating relief efforts in South Florida, which has now become the focal point of all national efforts to help Haiti.  • Br. Shu'ayb Brioche, head of the Imam Mahdi Islamic Centre in Haiti which was destroyed along with about 25 houses belonging to Shia Muslims.  • Other Muslim NGO's via the NGO Manager, Br. Imran Janmohamed.  After some discussion between Dr. Jaffer and Br. Shu'ayb, Br. Shu'ayb suggested that the funds collected through The World Federation would be best utilized in helping the poor and displaced Muslims in Haiti to rebuild their homes as well as the Al Mahdi Islamic Centre. The earthquake destroyed all of these buildings to rubble.	<ul> <li>Based on Br. Shu'ayb's recommendation of the needs of the local community there, and backed by Dr. Jaffer's suggestion to concentrate long term efforts on rebuilding the lives of the Muslims in Haiti as soon as the situation allows, The World Federation is now charting a plan forward to concentrate its efforts on utilizing the donations collected for the HAITI EARTHQUAKE RELIEF FUND 2010 to rebuild the homes and Centre that once housed our brothers and sisters and the hundreds of orphans of Haiti.</li> <li>Community members are urged to continue donating to the Haiti Relief Fund</li> </ul>
